Breakout Session A - 4:45pm

Dr. Thomas O'Brien: Professor, Dept. of Teaching, Learning & Educational Leadership (TLEL), Binghamton University, State University of New York (DH-211)

TITLE: Soft drinks, Subject Siloes, Synergy & Sweet Darwinian Diet Deliberations

DESCRIPTION: Personally and socially relevant Science-Technology-Society (STS) "literacy" requires understanding E.O. Wilson's Consilience: The Unity of Knowledge (1998). Even "well-educated" people fail to see that natural and human constructed systems need to be understood and managed by considering their inherent, natural, interdisciplinary synergy. In this presentation, discrepant event demonstrations serve as an entry to historical

developments in chemistry, physics, and biology that led to the mass marketing and devastating social impacts of unhealthy sugar-laden soft drinks. This case study models how 3-dimensional, *Next Generation Science Standards*-aligned teaching and cross-curricular collaborations benefits students and serve as the basis for engaging, ethical education.

Dr. Thomas O'Brien is a Professor at Binghamton University's Department of Teaching, Learning and Educational Leadership. He has co-directed professional development projects funded by the National Science Foundation, the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, and the NYS Education Department. He has published a 3-volume, grades 5-12 focused series, *Brain-Powered Science Teaching & Learning with Discrepant Events* (NSTA Press) and a co-edited/authored, grades K-5 focused book, *Science for the Next Generation: Preparing for the New Standards*.

Professor Stephanie Malmberg: Staff Associate, Student Success Squad; Co-lead, Achieving Success; Adjunct Instructor, Dept. of English, SUNY Broome. Lecturer, Dept. of Human Development; PhD Candidate, College of Community and Public Affairs, Binghamton University (DH-213)

TITLE: **Teaching for Social Justice in the Community College Classroom** DESCRIPTION: Teaching for social justice is a critical approach to designing and disseminating curricula in a manner that is culturally affirming, challenging of dominant structures and discourses, and enriches the learning of all students. Social justice education theory is a framework for teaching and learning and its implications for social action (Hackman, 2005). Transgressive pedagogies, often referred to as anti-racist pedagogies, are those that "involve multi-voiced engagement with multiple actors" with an "emphasis on colearning, cognitive justice, and the formation and development of individual and systemic agency" (Lotz-Sisitka, Wals, Kronlid, & McGarry, 2015, p. 78). These approaches serve as a theoretical framework that inform post-secondary approaches to teaching in increasingly diverse learning environments. This workshop serves to explore these theories, as well as experiential evidence from the field, to inform a practical approach to learning to teach for social justice in community college classrooms.

Stephanie Malmberg is a Staff Associate and adjunct faculty member at SUNY Broome, and teaches in the Department of Human Development at Binghamton University. She is a Ph.D. Candidate in the College of Community and Public Affairs at Binghamton, and her research agenda is informed by issues of access and equity in higher education. Her research seeks to bridge the gap between theory and practice in the creation of culturally relevant and sustaining pedagogical practices within community college classrooms.

Professor Gian Roma: Associate Professor and Chairperson of Business Programs, SUNY Broome (DH-222)

TITLE: Communicating and Assessing Ethical and Behavioral Performance for Students

DESCRIPTION: What ethical responsibility does a student have in his or her education? How can students better prepare themselves to succeed in an increasingly demanding, changing, and competitive world? One way is to educate themselves about the basic behaviors that are necessary to achieve academic, professional, and personal goals. This session clarifies the behaviors that lead to success and shows students a methodology to accurately assess performance in several behavioral areas.

Gian Roma is an Associate Professor and Chairperson for the Business Department at SUNY Broome. He has a BS in Industrial Technology from the Watson School at Binghamton University, and an MBA from the Martino Graduate School of Business at Fordham University. Professor Roma's book,

"Self-Management: Understanding, Communicating, and Assessing Behavioral Competency," is used in SUNY Broome's Freshman Experience courses.

TITLE: Tiger Parenting and Tiger Educating

DESCRIPTION: Orion Barber (President, Mu Eta Chapter of PTK), James Gill (Vice-President of Media Relations, PTK), Alexander Lewis (Vice-President of Advertising, PTK), Leah Best (Vice-President of Service, PTK), Kevin Carr (Student Assembly VP for Student Affairs), and Prof. Irene Byrnes (Faculty Adviser to PTK, Associate Professor of History, Philosophy, and Social Science Chancellor's Awards for Excellence in Faculty Service and Professional Service) offer a panel discussion on the book, Battle Hymn of the Tiger Mother.
