# **Keynote: Emerging Adulthood, Ages 18-29: The New (and Longer) Road to Adulthood**

Jeffrey Jensen Arnett, Ph.D. Senior Research Scholar Clark University

Dr. Arnett provided the developmental issues common to 18- to 29-year-olds, including identity explorations, instability, self- development, feeling in-between adolescence and adulthood, and sense of possibilities. The focus was on normal development, but implications for educating emerging adults will also be discussed. The goal informed the participants about normal development from ages 18 to 29, including how what is "normal" has changed over the past half century, as education has become broader and longer and as the ages of entering marriage and parenthood have come later. Historical developments over the past 70 years leading to the rise of the new life stage of emerging adulthood will be outlined. Implications for education include the likelihood of changing career paths at least once in response to identity explorations, as well as issues such as loneliness and other mental health challenges.

# **Looking Forward: Preparing Allied Dental Professionals for the Future of the Profession**

Cynthia C. Amyot, M.S., Ed.D. Professor Emerita, Adjunct Professor University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Dentistry

Jennifer A. Pieren, RDH, M.S. Program Director and Faculty Youngstown State University

Health care is changing, increased access to oral health care is improving, and the link between oral and systemic health is increasingly evident. Increasing access to oral health care for populations not served in the traditional practice setting has prompted states to legislate changes in the practice acts, expanding the scope of practice of allied dental professionals. Allied dental educators, leaders and professional associations have been calling for changes to meet these needs for over a decade. Yet, accreditation standards for allied dental programs remain stagnant and many programs have not made curricular changes. How do we, as individual faculty members, prepare students to meet these needs and develop leaders for the future? This workshop suggested practical strategies for faculty to enhance their didactic and clinical courses to teach students the full breadth and scope of the role in their allied dental profession.

# **Current Issues Affecting Dental Hygiene**

The Admission Test for Dental Hygiene (ATDH)

For many years, dental hygiene program directors and admission officers have voiced concerns and frustration around the lack of a standardized admission test constructed specifically for dental hygiene. The American Dental Association is pleased to announce a new testing program, the Admission Test for Dental Hygiene (ATDH). The test began administration in September 2021. This presentation provided important information concerning this new and exciting testing program and how dental hygiene programs can take advantage of this new tool for use in their admission processes.

The Dental Hygiene Licensure Objective Structured Clinical Examination (DHLOSCE)

For many years, dental boards across the United States have relied on successful completion of single encounter, patient- based procedure examinations and manikin examinations as fulfillment of boards' clinical licensure examination requirements. While usage of these examinations is widespread, accompanying that use are important questions concerning the undesirable situations and complications that can arise from the use of patients in the examination process, the dearth of peer-reviewed validity evidence supporting use of these examinations, and the ultimate value these examinations provide to the public. The Joint Commission on National Dental Examination's (JCNDE's) Dental Hygiene Licensure Objective Structured Clinical Examination

(DHLOSCE) will be a professionally developed and valid examination designed to help dental boards identify those who lack the clinical judgment and skills that are necessary for safe practice, thereby helping boards in their mission to protect the public. This presentation provided an update on this upcoming examination program.

# Using Mindfulness Skills to Address Burnout in Allied Dental Education

Shelly Withers, RDH, M.S., Ph.D. Department Chair, Dental Hygiene, Loma Linda University

Burnout is a serious concern for dental team members during education and in practice. Burnout has three main components: emotional exhaustion, a feeling of reduced personal accomplishment and depersonalization. Mindfulness has been shown to have a positive effect on burnout in the literature. Participants learned about the concepts of burnout and mindfulness skills and the relationship between them. We also discover which mindfulness skills are related to lower burnout and identify practical ways to develop the skill set. Supporting the mental health of dental team members will be beneficial for providers and patients alike.

# Collaborative and Strategic Budget Planning in Higher Education

Ann E. Barr-Gillespie, DPT, Ph.D. Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Pacific University

Allied dental program directors often enter their positions without any formal training in program budget management. This session provided information on the components of the typical academic departmental/program budget and help program directors know what questions to ask and how to set goals for strategic budgeting. This session included examples and discussion of how departmental/program budgets are linked to institutional budgets as well as strategic collaborations that can be mutually beneficial in a constrained budget environment.

# **Making Difficult Conversations Less Difficult**

Marnie Oakley, D.M.D. Senior Associate Dean University of Pittsburgh School of Dental Medicine

Why do we all prefer to avoid those conversations we know we need to have—knowing the problem will only worsen over time? This session helped participants learn how to 1) successfully lead those difficult conversations most people dread by embracing the need to fully prepare with a sense of deep reflection, gratitude and humility; 2) identify and apply personal preferences, approaches and tactics to influence success when resolving conflicts that include difficult conversations; and 3) discuss skills and techniques that serve to mitigate or prevent harmful conflict and difficult conversations. It's time to stop running from our circumstances and start leading our outcomes.
